Adding to an already illustrious career, Carolyn Lamm has been named by the Women's Bar Association of the District of Columbia as its 38th Woman Lawyer of the Year, joining the ranks of an esteemed group of past honorees. Lamm has been a partner at White & Case LLP since 1984. She founded and was the first to head White & Case's International Trade Practice Group.

Lamm joined White & Case as an associate in 1980 - becoming a member of the WBA that same year — after gaining experience in the Justice Department under the Attorney General's Honor Program. ## U.S. Attorney Issues A Call to Service

Imagine that you are a white man driving into Harlem, New York. You pull into a parking spot where two police cars pull up behind you. Four black officers approach and arrest you for a crime you allegedly committed. You are immediately taken to the precinct where all the police are black. Then you are taken to court where the judge, the previously empanelled jury, the prosecutor and all the people in the courtroom are all black. You are appointed counsel, again a black man. Do you think you will receive a fair trial?

his is the scenario United States Attorney for the District of Columbia, Roscoe C. Howard, Jr. asked participants to imagine during his March 20, 2002, luncheon discussion sponsored by the Women's Bar Association and the ABA White Collar Crime Committee's Young Lawyers Section. No one in the large room of legal professionals thought a fair trial would result. With only one exception, neither did any of Howard's law students at the University of Kansas where he taught criminal law for seven years prior to returning to the District in August 2002 to assume his present post.

Unfortunately, the scenario is one that many people face each day when they are pulled into our justice system. Individuals are surrounded by legal professionals who are dissimilar to them whether by gender, race, ethnicity or culture. In what Howard described as most the important experience of an individual's life, when someone is in court with his/her home, finances, personal relationships or even liberty at stake, he or she is in a sea of dissimilarity. No one in the system is like them. They are, in a sense, alone during this critical, frightening time.

U.S. Attorney Howard's charge to his audience was to change this. He believes that if legal professionals would accept his challenge and get involved, people would have better experiences when involved in

the justice system. As more women and minorities become a part of the justice system, citizens will see themselves represented in the jury, judge, prosecutor and/or defense attorney.

Relaying his own personal experience traveling up Interstate 95 from Virginia to Rhode Island via Connecticut for football camp at Brown University during his college days, Howard told of the multiple times he was stopped by the police. As a young African-American man traveling at night, he was a target for police. Each year during this trek to football camp he was pulled over, each time for a different reason. Each time the officer requested to search his car. Each time he consented. He consented because he did not know he could say no and because he did not want to spend a night in jail. He consented to make life easier. He later learned that the other black players on the team had similar experiences, but the white players never had been pulled over.

This kind of experience results in people being defensive toward or even fearing others dissimilar to them. Involvement of legal professionals in the community and community education will hopefully help abate scenarios like U.S. Attorney Howard's from continuing to occur generations into the future.

Upon returning to DC, Howard drove over to the neighborhood in Southeast where he stayed with his now-deceased aunt during the summers of his child-hood. He stopped to visit an elderly friend who still lived in the neighborhood. The elderly gentleman was literally locked in his home, fearful of the neighborhood that once flourished.

Parts of the District are not safe, feat by residents of those communities. One of his administration's priorities is heightened community involvement. Howard and many of his colleagues at the United States Attorney's Office are residents of the District. They are involved in the communities and know what is going on. Beyond that, he and his colleagues attend community meetings and hear what people are saying. Some prosecutors are now assigned to specific Washington, DC neighborhoods. They are dealing with all the crimes in an area so they know what the issues of the residents are and see the patterns and the needs of the neighbors.

The theme of this powerful and articulate presentation was the need for professionals to remember that they are counselors, looked to for guidance and advice. In this role we need to be involved and remember that we serve not only as representatives of the court and the justice system generally, but as representatives of the gender, race, ethnicity, and culture that is an inherent part of each of us and a role more important than any job title we may possess.

## Ombassador Bianchi Addresses International Forum

he United States and the Republic of Chile are in the process of negotiating a bilateral free trade agreement, which would liberalize commerce between the two countries and expand business and investment opportunities for private industry. On March 13th, the WBA International Forum and Women in International Trade co-sponsored a breakfast panel discussion at the Embassy of Chile, focusing on the history, current status, and business implications of the proposed agreement. The current Ambassador of Chile to the United States,

Andres Bianchi, spoke about the advantageous economic conditions in Chile and the anticipated benefits of the free trade agreement. John O'Leary, former U.S. Ambassador to Chile, described the history of the negotiations and the prospects for their successful conclusion. John Murphy, of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, provided insight into U.S. industry's support of the agreement. The discussion was moderated by Susan Watson of Dyer, Ellis & Joseph, and was attended by approximately 60 people.

a member of the Secretary of State's Committee on Private International Law and a member of the Council of the American Law Institute.

A dedicated servant to the bar community, Lamm is a past president of the District of Columbia Bar, and in August will be elected to the American Bar Association Board of Governors after lengthy service in its House of Delegates. Lamm addressed the WBA at our 2000 Annual Fall Kick-Off, encouraging women in the legal community to engage in bar activities as a means of professional development and advancement in the profession. "Carolyn has always been very supportive of the WBA and we are delighted that the WBA Awards Committee has selected her for the honor,"

said Deborah Israel, WBA President.

Since 1964, the WBA has presented the Woman Lawyer of the Year Award each year its Annual Awards Dinner, which will be held this year on May 16, 2002. The Award recognizes a woman for her exceptional achievements in the legal profession and/or her extraordinary contributions to the advancement of women in the profession.

# What is the WBA Foundation?

If you have asked yourself this question, then you may not know how important the Foundation is for you as a WBA member.

- Is the Foundation different from the WBA? The Foundation is the fundraising partner of the WBA. Governed by its own Board of Directors and independent of the WBA, the Foundation is a charitable organization with tax-exempt status under section 501(c)(3) of the tax code. But the Foundation is a "sponsored" foundation, which assures that it will always have a special connection to the WBA.
- What does the Foundation do? The Foundation's main function is to provide grants to other organizations or programs that serve the Foundation's mission. While the Foundation's stated mission has broad charitable and educational purposes, historically its focus has been to support programs that empower women lawyers and pursue justice for women. In this respect, the Foundation's objectives are very much aligned with those of the WBA. Like all organizations subject to section 501(c)(3) of the tax code, the Foundation is precluded from supporting candidates for political office.
- Does the Foundation affect me, as a WBA member? Many of the Foundation's grants are awarded to programs and events sponsored by the WBA or one of its committees. Did you know that your WBA newsletter, Raising the Bar, is fully funded by grants from the Foundation, as part of its educational mission?
- Who funds the Foundation's grants? The Foundation relies on WBA member donations to fund grants. In the last several years, the Foundation has initiated a fundraising campaign to build an endowment. The Foundation hopes that in the future it will fund grants exclusively from the interest income generated by the endowment, ensuring a reliable source for grants for many years to come.
- How can I contribute to the Foundation? There are many things you can do to contribute to the Foundation: make a tax-deductible donation to the Endowment Fund Campaign; ask your law firm or employer to make a tax-deductible donation to the Endowment Fund Campaign; participate in a Foundation fundraising activity; or buy a table at the Annual Awards Dinner on May 16, 2002 and deduct the price of the table in excess of \$80 per person.


